Budget Update	This week, both the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees began holding hearings on the Governor's May Revise Proposal. One key issue for the health care field is supporting the Managed Care Organization Tax, which has the potential to bring millions in additional revenue into the health care field. While this is an exciting development, some concerns about this plan have arisen. The Administration is interested in spreading the relief out over 8-10 years, which will dilute the annual funding hospitals can access. While there is a great deal to work out, the May Revise currently does not provide any direct funding from the MCO to hospitals and requires ongoing negotiations to settle on the distribution formula. Hospitals that focus on serving the Medi-Cal population continue to push for immediate funding relief in this budget year, as we continue to struggle with an inadequate Medi-Cal reimbursement structure. The Legislature has until June 15 to pass a balanced budget, but we expect negotiations on additional budget items to
	continue into September.

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
